Governance Legal Concepts: Overview Group Discussion Topics

 - Common Areas, insurance, to carry out legally imposed duties

 - Certain Association powers and functions are reserved to owners; the rest are exercised by the board



Governance Legal Concepts: Governing Documents

- Accurate nomenclature helps avoid confusion
- Recorded Declaration, CC&Rs, Survey Maps
- Articles of Incorporation
 - Name, Purposes, Duration, Assets on Dissolution, Indemnity, Agent, Incorporator, Initial Directors
- Bylaws
 - May contain any provisions for regulation and management of the affairs of the corp. not inconsistent with law or the articles
- Rules, Regulations & Board Resolutions



Governance Legal Concepts: Sources of Authority

- Statutes
 - Condo Act (RCW 64.34), HPRA (RCW 64.32), HOA Act (RCW 64.38), Nonprofit Act (RCW 24.03, 24.06), Foreclosure (RCW 61.12, 61.24), many more...
- Common Law
 - State Appellate & Supreme Court decisions; Federal Court decisions
- Governing Documents



Legal Standard of Care

• *Fiduciary Duty* is a legal term defined as:

"A duty of utmost good faith, trust, confidence, and candor owed by a fiduciary (such as a lawyer or corporate officer) to the beneficiary (such as a lawyer's client or a shareholder); a duty to act with the highest degree of honesty and loyalty toward another person and in the best interests of the owner person." <u>Blacks Law Dictionary</u>, 8th Ed. (2004)

Legal Standard of Care, Cont.

- Legal duty of Directors and how to discharge them?
 - New Act Condominium:
 - If elected by unit owners, ordinary and reasonable care
 - If appointed by Declarant, the care required of a fiduciary. RCW 64.34.308(1)(b)
 - Old Act Condominium:
 - Same as New Act Condos unless Declaration specifically requires different standard. RCW 64.34.010(1)
 - HOA:
 - Must exercise the degree of care and loyalty required of an officer or director of a nonprofit corporation. RCW 64.38.025



Legal Standard of Care, Cont.

- Tips on how to meet a Director's legal duty of care
- General Concepts:
 - Under Business Judgment Rule, it is possible to avoid liability if board decisions are within authority of association and made without bad faith or corrupt motive. But, case law suggests <u>directors' decisions must also be reasonable</u>. *Riss v. Angel*, 131 Wn. 2d 612, 632.
 - A director must act with such care as a reasonably prudent person in a like position would use under similar circumstances. *Id*.
 - Be informed! Do your diligence!
 - Directors may rely on information, reports, opinions and statements from officers or employees reasonably believed to be reliable, and from counsel, CPAs and other experts. RCW 24.03.127
